The <u>WIN Project</u> (WIN for Women and Men - Strengthening comprehensive security through innovating and networking for gender equality) is a strategic project that aims to accelerate the implementation of the OSCE 2004 Action Plan for the Promotion of Gender Equality.

The WIN Project aims to advance gender equality in four thematic pillars:



Women, Peace & Security



Violence Against Women & Girls



Women, Economy & Environment



Cross-cutting

How WIN makes an impact:



Empowers women to become decision-makers in traditionally male-dominated fields of peace and security and economy.



Addresses the lack of **practical knowledge**, **tools & awareness** on gender equality and its benefits, including for non-English speakers & tailored to the needs of OSCE's main stakeholders.



Fosters connections and professional support by cultivating professional networks and mentoring programs for women national security practitioners and policy makers, and replicating successful practices.



Supports existing networks and incubates new networks for women change-makers and men supporters of gender equality at the national and regional levels.



MID-TERM RESULTS ACHIEVED







Mid-term review took place in February-March2023andfocusedon progress toward project outcomes between July 2019 and October 2022, including four implementing partners' achievements.

Highlights of the MTR

- WIN interventions advancing gender equality and mainstreaming are highly relevant for the target groups.
- The many and varied activities and outputs achieved by the project were greatly appreciated by all stakeholders.
- Project results have been very strong in particular in stimulating collaboration and networking between stakeholders, publishing relevant knowledge products, and providing spaces for experience exchange.
- Project is well positioned to disseminate knowledge and capacity building modules, to bring together women and men from different countries to share experiences, and start collaborations.

WIN accelerates OSCE work in achieving comprehensive security

WIN contributes to implement the WPS agenda, international standards for prevention and response to gender-based violence, and women's economic and environmental empowerment in participating States in Eastern Europe, South-Eastern Europe, South Caucasus, and Central Asia - through studies, tools and capacity-building workshops for relevant ministries, security sector, and civil society representatives.

The WIN Project relies on a collaborative approach. WIN identifies synergies and areas of joint work with the OSCE's Executive structures and 13 Field Operations, which all have long-term close relationships with the Government and NGO sector and are highly skilled in working in the local languages. Close co-operation and co-ordination with UN agencies, EU, International NGOs, and women's mediation networks in the OSCE region ensure complementarity of efforts in the field.

WIN fosters connections, innovations and transformative activities

WIN introduces innovative and transformative approaches and tools to gender equality in all dimensions of comprehensive security. The WIN project's beneficiaries receive cutting-edge training in key security issues in accessible languages. The WIN Project **creates platforms** for OSCE-wide exchange of good practices, lessons learned, and knowledge transfer. WIN provides women working in the peace and security opportunities to participate in mentoring programmes, trainings, regional and cross-regional exchanges, and mutual learning from OSCE experts and peers.

WIN Project response to the war in Ukraine



The WIN Project supports women peacebuilders in Ukraine through funding, consultations and capacity-building. WIN Project's implementing partners – <u>Women's Information and Consultative Centre</u>, <u>Global Network for Women Peacebuilders</u>, <u>Women's Peace Dialogue Platform</u>, and <u>WAVE Network</u> – have all adapted their activities in response to the war in Ukraine. They are supporting women's organizations in Ukraine and neighbouring countries through counselling, sharing tools and resources and making the voices of women peacebuilders heard.

Key achievements in 2022-2023:

- Provision of a tailored psycho-social support programme for the members of the women peacebuilders platform "ICAN" (MOXY) network
- Two women's NGOs received emergency funding to cover direct humanitarian needs.
- Implementing partner <u>Women Against Violence</u> <u>Europe</u> developed a Toolkit on VAWG in conflict for service providers.



The **stories of women leaders** responding to the humanitarian crisis caused by the war against Ukraine

- Networking opportunities provided to 15 women leaders, peacebuilders and human rights defenders in Ukraine-focused events under the Secretary General's Networking Platform for Women Leaders, including Peacebuilders and Mediators.
- 76 staff members of the State Emergency Services of Ukraine built their skills and competencies in gender-responsive and disability-inclusive humanitarian action, and promoting women's leadership in humanitarian action.

Coming up in 2024:

- Through the partnership with WomenGoTech, 600 Ukrainian women will receive training and mentoring opportunities on participation in the digital economy
- Support to the implementation of the Ukrainian National Action Plan on UNSCR 1325, including through trainings on conflict-related sexual violence and localization of action plans for government agencies and local women's organizations.


