

REMARKS BY H.E. AMBASSADOR DR. ZIA NEZAM PERMANENT MISSION OF AFGHANISTAN OSCE – PC MEETING – THU 31 MAY 2007

Mr. Chairman,

Afghanistan joins others in welcoming our distinguished guest today to the OSCE's Permanent Council. Let me thank the Secretary of State, Madame Rice, for her steady personal efforts as well as for the continued and strong support of the United States to my country. I also seize this opportunity to thank all delegations whose countries are contributing to the reconstruction and the establishment of security in my country.

Mr. Chairman,

The past 25 years of war have severely affected the Afghan society as a whole. During this period, serious abuses of human rights took place. State and judicial institutions collapsed.

Following the fall of the barbaric Taliban regime in December 2001, however, Afghanistan, with the generous support of the international community, achieved substantial progress. Despite this, many difficulties remain to be tackled, specifically in the area of security and reconstruction. Hence, we continue to require the international community to assist Afghanistan.

Mr. Chairman,

Afghanistan shares borders with three Participating states of the OSCE. We

share not only borders but also mutual interests in terms of security, related to

issues such as border management and actions to counter terrorism and

trafficking of arms and drugs.

Afghanistan attaches great importance to the OSCE Border Security and

Management Concept and we are very keen to further strengthen co-

operation with the organization. The OSCE has invaluable experience and

has very successfully developed a number of policing and border

management programmes in some participating states. It is our desire to learn

from the OSCE - in areas like policing, border management and building of

institutions. Therefore, we would like to encourage the inclusion of

Afghanistan in respective training programmes and joint activities. I am

convinced that this would greatly enhance the success of our joint efforts in

countering terrorism, cultivation and trafficking of drugs and other crimes.

We strongly believe that a stable, prosperous and democratic Afghanistan will

be beneficial to all countries in the region and beyond.

Finally, let me say that I would be very interested to hear from Secretary Rice

about her views on the possible future role of the OSCE in Afghanistan.
