EU statement on the sentence of journalist Elena Bondar in Uzbekistan

The EU has learned with concern that Elena Bondar, an independent journalist who reports on various social issues in Uzbekistan, was sentenced in first instance to a heavy fine on 6 April 2012 by the Yunusabadsky district court of Tashkent on charges of "Manufacture, possession or distribution of materials that promote national, racial, ethnic or religious hatred" under Article 184-3 of the Administrative Code of Uzbekistan.

We are concerned that during the trial several procedural violations have been reported which has prompted us to question whether Elena Bondar's right to a fair trial was respected. According to reports, Elena Bondar did not receive a written summons to attend the court hearing and the accusation and sentence was based on a doubtful testimony of only one witness.

We understand that the case of Elena Bondar is going to be taken to a court of higher instance. We call on the Uzbek authorities to ensure Elena Bondar's right to a fair trial fully consistent with Uzbekistan's commitments to international standards on the rule of law. We will continue to closely monitor developments related to the appeal process.

We reiterate our call on the Uzbek authorities to release those arbitrarily detained and convicted for exercising their right to freedom of opinion and expression.

The Acceding Country Croatia*, the Candidate Countries the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia*, Montenegro*, Iceland+ and Serbia*, the Countries of the Stabilisation and Association Process and potential candidates Albania and Bosnia and Herzegovina, and the EFTA country Norway, member of the European Economic Area, as well as the Republic of Moldova, align themselves with this statement.
