LATEST NEWS

- The security situation in eastern Ukraine continued to be volatile and tense. Although the SMM recorded an increase in the number of ceasefire violations during the week of 9-15 January, the mission observed a decline in violations at all main hotspots the following week.
- The vast majority of recorded ceasefire violations occurred to the east and south-east of Svitlodarsk, the Avdiivka-Yasynuvata-Donetsk airport area, to the north-east and east of Mariupol, in areas west and north of Horlivka, and in western Luhansk region. Stanytsia Luhanska, which was previously relatively quiet, saw a rise in violence in the second week, accounting for five per cent of all recorded ceasefire violations.
- The disengagement process remained stalled. The SMM's access to the three disengagement areas continued to be restricted due to mines and unexploded ordnance (UXO), though the SMM was able to partially monitor them, including through remote observation. The SMM observed ceasefire violations in or near the three disengagement areas.
- Shell-damage to essential civilian infrastructure cut off or threatened the supply of water, gas and electricity in many areas. Civilians also face freezing winter conditions.
- In his address to the OSCE Permanent Council on 19 January, the SMM Chief Monitor Ambassador Ertugrul Apakan warned that failure to implement Minsk agreements meant that the risk of further escalation remained. See: www.osce.org/cio/294751
